2016 has been another outstanding year for us. As one of the leading producers of new plays for young audiences in the UK we bring high-quality theatre experiences to children and young people across the entire country. This year we visited 68 schools and theatres in 48 local authorities with our productions and projects reaching 10,000 young people.

We were delighted to work with award-winning writers Sabrina Mahfouz and Robert Alan Evans to create our productions exploring sexism and gender equality. We commissioned three original audio plays for our Switched On programme and partnered with UBS and Linklaters LLP to take Standpoint, our political speech-making programme, to students in London.

We are incredibly proud to have our work recognised by the industry. Both *Rise Up* by Lisa Evans and *What The Thunder Said* by Ed Harris took home 'Best Play for Young Audiences' at the Writers' Guild of Great Britain Awards, whilst *Layla's Room* by Sabrina Mahfouz has been nominated for the James Tait Black Prize.

Thank you to everyone who has supported us this year. Theatre Centre will strive to reach more children and young people, whatever their circumstances and wherever they live.

# Layla's Room

### By Sabrina Mahfouz



Collected from a national survey, award-winning poet Sabrina Mahfouz weaved together the voices of 1,000 teens trying to make sense of the realities, difficulties and absurdities of their lives in the UK today. *Layla's Room* sparked important conversations about sexual harassment in secondary schools.

# What next

#### Twist by Chino Odimba

A radical adaptation of Charles Dickens' classic novel brought into the modern day and framed by the global refugee crisis. This year's Brian Way Commission, *Twist* will be touring the UK in autumn 2017.

#### Home

Home is a project working with 13-16 year olds in Newham, Hackney and Tower Hamlets to explore their experiences of multicultural London, looking at identity, culture, home and belonging.

#### Switched On

A dynamic and interactive resource for teaching the Personal, Social, Health and Economic education curriculum in schools. We commission will new audio dramas exploring live and urgent issues facing young people.

#### **Standpoint**

Delivered with our corporate partners, Standpoint is Theatre Centre's speech-making programme for secondary schools.

#### **Creative Roots**

Intensive workshops for 13-19 year olds to learn new drama skills, build confidence and open doors to a creative career. Participants will form a youth advisory board bringing their voices to the centre of our organisation.

#### **Little Boxes**

We intend to revive our production *Little Boxes* and reach even more children by touring to festivals and family arts events as well as many more primary schools.

#### Writers' Fellowship


A three year programme of learning, the Writers' Fellowship offers rising talents the opportunity to learn more about the craft of writing for young audiences.



### **Finance**

2015/16 was the first year of Theatre Centre's new business plan to develop income streams and strengthen the financial resilience of the company.

We are pleased to report that this year Theatre Centre made a successful application to Arts Council England's Catalyst: Evolve programme, a strategic investment to support philanthropic giving in the arts and cultural sector. This means any gift from our donors over the next 3 years will be match funded.



# Get closer
